Councillor Trevor Grant was welcomed on to the Council in September and we are currently in the process of recruiting another Councillor to replace Councillor Caroline Evans who has recently resigned from the Council. We would like to thank Caroline for all her hard work on behalf of Wellow residents.

As many of you will be aware, our Clerk, Lorraine Wheeler left her post just after last year's Annual Parish Meeting and we have been fortunate to recruit Sharon Whitehouse as our Clerk. She has very quickly taken over the reins and keeps us all very much in line! Sharon has been joined by Karen, our part-time Admin Assistant and together they make a formidable team.

I would personally like to take this opportunity to thank all the Councillors who have worked so hard during this past year on behalf of the residents of Wellow. The Council has enjoyed an extremely busy year and whilst working on the general everyday work, we have also been pushing ahead with various larger projects. All members of the Council are unpaid volunteers, most of whom are also in full-time employment and it is very much to their credit that they still find time, and are willing, to offer their services to the community.

2. Parish Council Activities

Oak Tree Carving and Bench – Lower Common Road Recreation Ground

In December 2016, the old oak tree bordering Lower Common Road was transformed into a woodland carving/bench following the need for it to be felled. The carving was paid for through a Grant from our Test Valley Ward Councillors and the

generosity of a resident of Wellow. This extra seating is not only a practical addition but also an attractive feature in the Recreation Ground.

Replacement of Wellow Cricket Pavilion

Designs for the replacement of the Wellow Cricket Pavilion have now been agreed between the Council and the Cricket Club. Due to the original Planning consent having expired, a Planning application for the new structure was submitted and this was given approval in April 2017. It is intended that this project will commence immediately following the end of this season's fixtures and will be ready for the new season in 2018. Plans for the exterior and interior of the building are available to view this evening. As many of you will be aware, £80,000 has been set aside for some time towards the replacement of the Pavilion and I am pleased to report that the Council has also been successful in securing a further £23,443.80 through a Funding Bid with Test Valley Borough Council's Community Asset Fund. This should ensure that we are able to complete the project to a high standard. In order to cut back on costs where possible, Council members and members of the Cricket Club will be lending a hand wherever possible, such as helping with the painting, decorating – if anyone else would like to volunteer to help, you will be enthusiastically welcomed!

Wellow Community Garden

The proposed design drawing for the new Wellow Community Garden which will be established to the left hand side of the Cricket Pavilion in the Recreation Ground is available to view this evening.

As shown on the design drawing, the idea is to install a circular path approximately 10 metres in diameter with seating areas placed at North, South, East and West and a central planted area. Some of the seats will be back-to-back enabling a view of either the garden or the cricket/play areas. A flagpole will be placed in the centre which will create a sun dial effect with demarked lines in the paving delineating hours of the day. The idea is to use planting that requires very little maintenance but with year round effect.

Applications have been made for Grant Funding for this project which, if successful, will commence in August this year. The work should take three to four weeks to complete.

Wellow Neighbourhood Plan

Following an overwhelmingly positive response from residents in favour of creating a Wellow Neighbourhood Plan, the Council has now appointed Mr Alan Wright as Independent Chairman of the Steering Group to carry out this project and Cllr Trevor Grant as Vice Chair. Although Alan is relatively new to the village, he brings with him a wealth of experience having been involved in the preparation of a Neighbourhood

Plan in his previous town. Over the coming weeks Alan and Trevor will be appointing volunteer members to the main Steering Group and also to various Working Groups who will be working on individual aspects of the Plan as well as defining particular topics for the Neighbourhood Plan to concentrate on.

Other Activities

Wellow Common SSI

Wellow Parish Council owns and is responsible for the management of Wellow Common which is part of the New Forest National Park and an SSSI (Site of Special Scientific Interest). A detailed Management Plan covering the years 2010 to 2019 has been agreed with Natural England and the grant we receive from them is £17,808 per year to cover the costs of implementing it. In the year 2016 to 2017 further gorse burning and rhododendron removal, as recommended by Natural England, has been undertaken. In addition, the Monkey Jump access track and car park has been re-surfaced along with drainage improvements and clearance of the cattle grid at the A36 intersection. The Plantation Road Car Park has also been re-surfaced and road side ditching repaired. The Parish Council is looking for volunteers to help with removal of ragwort late next spring, please contact the Clerk or Cllr Trevor Grant email: cllrtgrant@wellowparish.org.uk for more information or to register your interest. In the coming year, after the ground nesting bird season ends in July, further gorse and rhododendron clearance will continue along with removal of ferns and some thinning of silver birch trees.

Responsible Dog Ownership on Wellow Common

The Parish Council has been working alongside other members of the Dogs Forum to move towards engaging with users of the Common in a positive and dog walker friendly way. 'Clean up after your dog' signs are displayed and we hope that dog walkers will use the bins paid for and provided by the Parish Council to dispose of dog litter. A request to keep to the main tracks during the ground nesting bird season has been posted on the website, in the Parish newsletter and via Facebook. Yellow signs which state all dogs must be on a lead from March to July have been put out at entrance points.

If you witness someone letting their dog foul without cleaning it up afterwards in a public place, or being irresponsible in allowing their dog to behave dangerously or out of control, you should report this to the Parish Council or the Environmental Health Team at Test Valley Borough Council. Include the name and address of the person in charge of the dog (if known), a description of the dog, plus details of the date, time and place of the offence.

Footpaths

Wellow Parish is very lucky to have a total of 24 Public Rights of Way, more commonly referred to as footpaths. These footpaths are designated with a unique number for each Parish by the Hampshire Council Rights of Way department and a copy of the map showing each footpath is attached. Wellow Parish Council normally spends around £1,000 on footpath maintenance which is matched by Hampshire Council through the 'Lengthsman Scheme'.

Over the last 12 months the Parish Council has gained additional grant assistance of £1,125 towards the cost of footpath maintenance. Major clearance and improvement has concentrated on the most used footpaths as follows:

Footpath 7 (St Margaret's Church to Foxes Lane) - major cut back of tree and vegetation growth

Footpath 17 (Gazing Lane to footpath 18)- reforming of the drainage ditch, laying of hard core on path, major cut back of tree and vegetation growth and removal of fallen tree

Footpath 18 (Romsey Road to Buttons Lane) - major cut back of tree and vegetation growth


Footpath 22 (Foxes Lane to Scallows Lane) – extending the 'board walk' by a further nine metres, through poorly drained areas and major cut back of tree and vegetation growth.

Further improvements are planned in the coming year for Footpath 22 with metal kissing gates replacing the stile and improvements to the drainage/walkway on Footpath 7.

Litter Picking

We have again needed to spend money in the last year to clear litter and fly tipping from around the Parish. The Council has litter picking equipment and more volunteers are required on a regular basis to help keep the Parish free of litter and grime.

The Council would like to thank those parishioners who are active themselves clearing litter, in particular Fiona Mobbs, who has recently been litter picking around Wellow. Fiona has a Facebook site where she keeps followers up to date on her latest litter picking activities.

The Council had some response from last year's request for volunteer assistance in litter picking. However, due to safety requirements there needs to be a minimum number of volunteers in a group collecting together, so there is still a need for more volunteers to take further steps. The Parish Council has provisionally set aside 20th May as a date for organising a Wellow 'clean up'. Play Area, Lower Common Road Recreation Ground

The play area in the Recreation Ground continues to be very popular. The play equipment is regularly monitored and during the past year new chain guards have been fitted on the Junior swings, new rubber bumpers fitted on the see-saw and a safety warning/information sign placed on the Basketball pitch. My thanks to Cllr Sue Jones for her work to ensure that the Play Area is safe and fit for purpose.

Hatches Farm, Sports Ground

Fencing repairs have been completed along the boundary nearest to the Trim Trail, as well as to the front entrance. The old parish notice board was handed over to the sports clubs in August for their use. Wellow Youth Football Club continues to lease the pavilion and manage the football facility.

Remembrance Sunday – 13th November 2016

There was an excellent attendance, led by veterans and young people from the village for this year's Remembrance Day Service at the Wellow Memorial. After the Parade, refreshments provided by Parish Councillors, were served at Wellow Village Hall. Thank you to everyone involved with the preparations for all their help.

Wellow Area Poppy Appeal 2016

Phil Stenner continues as the Poppy Appeal Organiser for Wellow and District British Legion and the 2016 Appeal raised £5,042.92.

As always, the organiser wishes to say a big thank you to all who supported the appeal, especially the house to house collectors and local businesses who had a collecting tin on their counter. Special thanks go to Frank Moody who kindly donated a quantity of his book 'Wartime Memories' for sale in aid of the Poppy Appeal.

Bus Shelters

Regular cleaning and maintenance work continues on the Parish bus shelters. The wooden shelter on Lower Common Road which was damaged by vandalism has recently been repaired. Quotes have been obtained for replacing the cover of the notice board in the A27 Shootash bus shelter which has also been vandalised.

Parish Newsletter and Website

A new style Nightingale Times has been introduced this year to very positive feedback. The new editor Cllr Trevor Grant is keen to engage with the community and we had an excellent response from Parishioners in reply to our plea for letters of support for the Community Garden funding bid. Also many of you took the time to let us know about your concerns on speeding in the Parish which was much appreciated. The Parish Council would like to take this opportunity to pass on its thanks to Lesley Weldon who had continued to be involved with the production of the Parish Newsletter long after she had left the role of Clerk.

Now that the office staff have found their feet a little, focus is being turned towards keeping Parishioners informed on the latest issues via the website and social media.

Volunteers

The Parish Council is always in need of volunteers to support the many varied tasks each year, including litter picking, footpath maintenance and general work around the village. Please let the Clerk know if you are interested.

Parish Council Finances 2016/2017

The attached Balance Sheet for 2016/2017 at Appendix 1 shows that Wellow Parish Council has total Assets, less Current Liabilities, of £219,619. This includes a General Reserve of £33,372, which is in line with the recommendation that General Reserves should be approximately 2/3rd's of the Precept. Wellow Parish Council's 2016/2017 Precept was £65,000. The remaining reserves are earmarked for future projects as listed on the attached Balance Sheet.

The 2016/2017 figures used to produce these reports have been audited by the Internal Auditor to the end of February 2017. Final accounts are due to be inspected by the Internal Auditor towards the end of May and will be finalised in time to meet the requirement to submit the annual return. BDO LLP, the External Auditor, has requested the Wellow Parish Council annual return on or before 26th June 2017.

Any person interested has the right to inspect the accounts and all related documents. These documents are to be made available on reasonable notice by application between the hours of 10.00am and 12.00 noon on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays commencing on 3rd July 2017 up to 11th August 2017. Please contact the Clerk to make an appointment and for further details. Local electors and their representatives have the right to question the External Auditor about the accounts and object to the accounts or any item on them. Written notice of an objection must first be given to the External Auditor and a copy sent to the council/meeting. The External Auditor can be contacted for this purpose from 3rd July 2017 until 11th August 2017. Additional charges will be made by the External Auditor for any time spent on electors' questions or objections.

Accounts are shown at Appendices 1 and 2. Detailed accounts are available on request. Monthly Income and Expenditure Reports can be viewed on the Parish Website along with the Council's Minutes.

Grants

The Parish Council is able to offer small Grants to local organisations. During the past year we have awarded the following: Victim Support £100; Wellow Village Hall £500; St. Margaret's Church £300; West Wellow Scout Group £200; Wellow School £200; The Mountbatten School £200.

Reports from Wellow Sports Clubs 2016/17

WELLOW & PLAITFORD CRICKET CLUB

Last year Wellow & Plaitford Cricket Club Adult Team were again able to return to the Hampshire League. The season went well, particularly with regards to Lee Palmer's batting skills, Tom Farr's bowling and Lewis Oliver's batting and bowling skills. At the end of the season they took the title for their division and have now been promoted to a higher league for this season.

For the Colts there was a good intake at the U9 age group and were able to play a good mixture of abilities and ages, and still finished mid table against stronger teams with district and County players. The U11 age group worked well together and had a great season finishing 3rd in the league with a historic victory over Totton & Ealing. The U13 age group however had a hard season due to both bad weather and being short of players. However they were supported by a number of U11's and U9 players and managed to finish off the season.

For the coming year, all Colt training will take place on a Wednesday evening. There will also be the running of the new "All Stars" cricket program that the ESB are heavily promoting, which is aimed at children aged 5-8 years old who are new to cricket. Wellow School is also taking part in the "Chance to Shine" program which is also run through the ESB and will hopefully encourage more children to join the club.

So we are all looking forward to a new and challenging season for both the Adult and Colt teams.

Please come and join us to either to play in one of our teams or just to join as a social member and have a good afternoon watching cricket on the village green.

WELLOW YOUTH FOOTBALL CLUB

Wellow Youth Football Club has had yet another successful year providing team football for children in and around the Wellow area. In the eight years since the club was formed with just two sides, we have now expanded to over 150 regular participants split between nine sides that represent the village at ages ranging from under 7 to under 18's. The club also continues to encourage and help our coaches to get their FA Coaching badges, and provides fully qualified coaches to help with training at all levels of the club, and we have also seen some members get their referee qualifications.

In the last Season, Hatches Farm has seen thousands of people either participate or watch competitive football matches, as well as similar numbers of people coming along to our weekly training sessions that continue throughout the year. Despite rain and waterlogged pitches, it has been yet another year of the facility being fully used by the community, and in addition we continue to see groups of youths coming along to use the goals outside our normal training sessions.

Although the philosophy and ethos of the club is very much centred on participation and player development rather than 'winning at all costs', this has still been a good year for several of our sides.

All of our sides have had good wins this season, with the under 11's currently having reached the semi-final of their cup, and the Under7's, 8's and 9's all having very successful seasons with each side only losing a few of their games. Our Under 18's have had some notable wins including a Hampshire Cup victory over a Bournemouth Academy side, and wins over our nearby rivals Romsey Town.

All in all, yet another year of good football and expansion for the Wellow Youth Football Club.

WELLOW TENNIS CLUB

Wellow Tennis Club started up in 1987 so this year will be our 30th anniversary. There have been up and downs in membership but we continue to do reasonably well and still have a good number of members who have been with us since 1987. Every Club though loses members for various reasons so we need to continually recruit to keep the club going. Wellow play in a league called the Sarum league (based around Salisbury) which started in 1986 and when you look at the early league tables, they were full of small village clubs like Wellow. Now that those village clubs are few and far between as a lot have now folded. As well as tennis fading in popularity, there has been a move to the big tennis centres (such as David Lloyd). Wellow is fortunate to still have a thriving club but there is no guarantee that it will always be there without more members and village support.

Last season was a good one for the Club in league tennis. In the Sarum League (a mixed league with each team consisting of 2 men and 2 ladies) the A team finished 2nd in Div 1 in the summer and 3rd in the winter (the highest positions since the early 90's) while the B team won Div 2 and just missed out on promotion in the winter. The C team continued to offer competitive inter club competition to everyone and is still the breeding ground for talent for the first two main teams. The Ladies team did very well and won promotion to the top Southampton division while the Apsley (4 men and 4 ladies) did well in Division 1 of that league.

Social tennis sessions continued to be well supported and popular. The Club has a great reputation for welcoming people of all levels into our sessions which we are very proud of. Small social club tournaments were held throughout the year where players from all levels compete together in a great atmosphere.

On the junior front, we were disappointed that the work the Romsey coach was doing at Wellow School stopped but understand that funding for sport in schools made it difficult. The Club is doing something with a few juniors (free of charge) but we would like to do more. Attracting a coach though is almost impossible. Again, it is easier for a coach at the big tennis centres with indoor facilities so that is where they want to work. Offering coaching (particularly juniors) is still our biggest disappointment but it's not through lack of effort. The solution is very difficult to find.

One final part of the Club is "Pay and Play". The Club's contract with the Council made the Club responsible for managing "Pay and Play" and the Club needs the revenue from this to help offset the rent to the Council. Last year was disappointing for a number of reasons and something we must work on this year.

A good year but with some concerns for the future which we will continue to work on. New members always welcome!
