Updates in the Parish Office

Speeding in Wellow

Speeding in the village and surrounding areas is becoming a real problem, sometimes by residents driving too fast but more because Maurys Lane, Romsey Road, Whinwhistle, Lower Common Road and Canada are becoming 'rat runs' for vehicles and delivery drivers trying to access or bypass parts of the A36 and other main routes. The Council is in the process of looking at options to help combat this problem such as more use of flashing 30 mph speed signs. We currently share a sign with several other villages which means that Wellow only has limited periods of use.

Emergency Packs for vulnerable residents


In the unlikely event of a long term power cut of up to 72 hours affecting vulnerable residents in the village, the Parish Council has been given a number of Emergency Packs to help during this time. If a long term power cut does happen, and you know of a vulnerable person living near you, please contact the Parish Clerk on 01794 323275 and a pack will be issued.

Proposed Community Garden - we need your input

The Council is looking at creating a Community Garden area to the left of the current Cricket Pavilion at the Recreation Ground in Wellow. This is currently a very scruffy rough bank. The plan is to start as soon

as funding for the project is secured. There is currently very little seating in the Recreation Ground for residents and visitors to watch the cricket, sit whilst their children use the play and games areas or simply take a break when walking the dog!

As shown in the graphic the idea is to install a circular path approximately 10 metres in diameter with seating areas placed at North, South, East and West and a central planted area. Some of the seats would be back to back enabling a view of either the garden or the cricket/play areas. A flagpole would be placed in the centre which would create a sun dial effect with de-marked lines in the paving delineating hours of the day. The idea is to use planting that requires very little maintenance but with year round effect.



If you agree that this project is a good idea and would benefit residents and visitors to the village, please send a short e-mail or letter of support to the Parish Council. This support will help considerably as we are currently trying to secure grant funding and proof of support from residents is essential in this process.

Sad news

A focus on golf

Congratulations to teams at Wellow Golf Club in their 25th Anniversary Year. The junior section grows from strength to strength and this year reached the final of the Royal British Legion Poppy Golf Matchplay Tournament, just losing out to a Rotherham team that included two England players. The senior team won their first ever Monty League title in beating the favourites, Bramshaw Golf Club, This was followed by a strong runners-up performance against Romsey Golf Club in the Swann Trophy.

The Council was recently approached by the Red Rover Public House who, when clearing out part of their premises, had found a quantity of old paintings and photographs of Wellow, its residents and other local areas, some dating back to the late 1800s. Remembrance Sunday 13th November 2016



Really super turnout led by veterans and young people from the village for this year's Remembrance Day service at the Wellow Memorial. Service The was conducted by Rev. Chris Pettet. The this parade year included two horses from the Equestrian Centre in Wellow. The use of horses

during WW1 is well documented and presented the opportunity to not only commemorate and honour the human sacrifices of War but also other contributors such as the 1.3 million horses and mules who were involved in the conflict of WW1. One hundred and ten thousand of these 1.3 million horses passed through a giant military depot at Pauncefoot Hill where they and their handlers were trained before being shipped to War. The 500 acre site housed 2,000 staff who prepared tens of thousands of horses from all over the world between 1915 and 1919. Approximately 1 in 10 ten horses survived the War. A statue in their memory was unveiled by the Princess Royal in Romsey's Memorial Park on the 3rd July 2015.

After the parade, refreshments provided by Parish Councillors were served at Wellow Village Hall. Thanks to all in the village who helped to make this a memorable occasion.

Wellow and housing in the New Forest

We should all remember and value that we live alongside the New Forest National Park (NFNP) one of Europe's most sensitive ecological areas. The Blackwater Wildlife Corridor has an immense amount of wildlife with otters, crayfish, kingfishers and bats. It is within the Mottisfont Bat Protection Zone and supports a hugely varied and vitally important insect life. Starting in the NFNP the River Blackwater flows in to the Test, a world famous trout/salmon river. Leakage from any local new housing site, flooding and sewage overflow could easily threaten or destroy such a sensitive environment.

Whilst New Forest District Council latest proposals for significant new housing do not directly affect Wellow, the environmental, traffic and other impacts would be enormous to the whole area and seriously to the detriment of the NFNP and Wellow. We want you be aware this is happening on our doorstep and to encourage you to make your views known directly to the planning authorities or though us at the Wellow Parish Council.

Neighbourhood Plan Update

Wellow Village Hall was buzzing on Saturday Night 12th November. The Neighbourhood Plan Committee had arranged a debate titled "Question Time" modeled on the BBC Question Time programme. Around 70 people attended and were invited to ask questions and contribute ideas about the needs and future of the village.

Areas of concern included residential development, traffic management, congestion around the shops and access to the shops by older residents. Neighbourhood Planning engagement with young people and parents of school age children was also raised.

The Neighbourhood Plan is your plan and it was great that eleven meeting participants expressed an interest in joining the committee. Within the Parish Website there is a link to the Neighbourhood Plan website where residents can find updates regarding activities, progress, meetings and contact details for committee members.

Tree update

The condemned oak tree along Lower Common Road was felled early in October. However, rather than lose such a very old tree completely, the Council, after consultation, have decided to have the tree stump adapted to form a bench. This will be carved (by a professional wood carver) with a 'woodland scene'. A match funded grant of £300 has very kindly been given by Cllrs Gordon Bailey and Nick Adams-King from their TVBC grant fund and a resident of the village, Ms Babna Mehta-Athwal has very kindly offered to donate the remaining £300 to enable the work to go ahead. Our thanks go to them for their generosity. This extra seating will not only be a practical addition but also, we believe, an attractive feature in the Recreation Ground.

Flood prevention, hedges and keeping the footpaths clear

Wow, what an Autumn we had! But now the leaves continue to fall down upon us filling up ditches and blocking drains. Please help keep the ditches, drains and footpaths clear, trim boundary hedges and let the Council know if there are any particular problems that may need to be addressed. We think our footpaths are an important feature of and asset to Wellow. Maintaining them is a challenge. Any ideas you may have would be appreciated.
